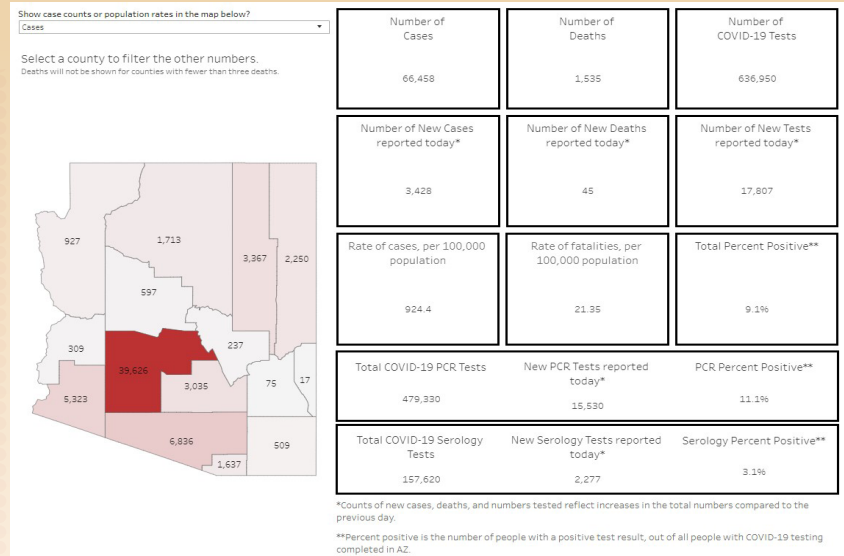




TOHONO O'ODHAM NATION UNIFIED COMMAND PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

The State of Arizona is currently experiencing a surge of COVID-19 cases. The Arizona Department of Health Services (AZDHS) is reporting 66,458 cases in the state, with 6,836 cases in Pima County.

On Friday, June 26, 2020, Tucson Mayor Regina Romero, reported in an interview with CNN that there are currently 10 Intensive Care Unit (ICU) beds available in Tucson, Az, with AZDHS reporting 209 ICU beds available throughout the state.



The Tohono O'odham Nation's ability to combat Coronavirus COVID-19 relies on each individual's effort to protect the community as a whole. The Unified Command would like to remind everyone of the following:

- Mandated Curfew reinstated in **Executive Order 2020-06**, from 9 PM to 6 AM.
- Mandated prohibition of Social Gatherings in **Executive Order 2020-07** (1.b.)
- Requirement of individuals to wear face coverings in all public spaces where physical distancing is not possible, as stated in **Executive Order 2020-07** (1.c.)
 - "Public Spaces" means any place that is accessible by the general public (indoor and outdoor), including but not limited to; all governmental facilities, grocery stores, gas stations, convenience stores, post offices, establishments serving food or beverages, establishments offering recreational activities or entertainment and places that offer medical or health services or transportation to the general public.
 - "Face masks or coverings" means cloth, fabric or other soft material that covers the nose and mouth. Coverings may be homemade or factory-made, or may be improvised from ordinary materials such as a scarf or bandana.
 - *Limited Exceptions* to face coverings include children under the age of six (6); those who should not wear face coverings due to medical conditions; those with mental health conditions or developmental disabilities; or first responders where face covering would interfere with their duties.
